

- 18yrs & older? Ensure you have a valid Police Record Check. Hint: it is valid for 3years.
- Maintenance evaluations/ Evaluations & Goals: discuss these with your RIC now. Hint: if you required a maintenance evaluation last season, and did not get one, you have until December 15th, 2014.

As promised last season, the pay rate for each officiating level has increased by \$2.00/game effective for the 2014/2015 season.

With officiating development being a major focus, we encourage you to actively participate in your own development, as well as attending tournaments for the exposure we all need. 

Evaluations Manager

I would like to go over the following for people using the evaluations process.

<u>Evaluators</u>

Use the Excel file for submitting evaluations and please send them to <u>evals@rogers.com</u>. Make sure that you fill in your personal

information so that we know to whom and where the cheque is sent. There is a new

date format in use. September 2, 2014 will be entered 2 Sep 14 on the form.

You can only claim for evaluations made in the previous 30 days, but you need to use this form for all of the evaluations you submit. Please don't send in evaluations without having sent the online Excel form. You do not need to send me a hard copy of the online form when you mail your yellow copies.

I will email you a copy of the accepted form, when I send it in to the office for payment. If you don't get that copy back within a few days of submitting, send me a note. This will get your money to you sooner, and ensure that the process is continuing.

If an official sends in a request to upgrade, I will need your evaluation(s) to allow that request to proceed. Please submit evaluations as soon as possible to avoid delays to those upgrading.

Regional Coordinators

I will send you monthly updates of all evaluations. This eliminates the need to get the pink copies back to all of you. If any of you would like to see the pink copies, please contact me and advise me to do so. I will get them to you as the season progresses, otherwise, I will not keep them unnecessarily.

Officials

I cannot stress how easily evaluations can become lost in the process. Always keep your copy of any evaluations that prove that you have upgraded, or maintained your level. Feel free to email me at the end of the season, to check to see if your evaluation(s) have been added to the database.

If you're upgrading and have not heard from your Coordinator (for Level 1 and Level 2 upgrades), or Karen (for Level 3 and Level 4 upgrades) within 2 weeks of submitting, please e-mail me directly at <u>evals@rogers.com</u>. I can advise as to what may be holding the request back. Most often, 1 of your evaluations was not found, and I have to confirm with the evaluator that he or she has their copy of the form needed.

Don't forget that is up to you to make sure that an evaluator is planning to see you, especially during tournaments. Some are skating as well as evaluating, or you may have been overlooked in advance. So verifying that they will be at your game to see you is very important. This will help to avoid disappointment in advancing through the system.

POD: The Year in Review

What is the P.O.D. Program, and How Can You Get Involved? I am thrilled to be working again with some of Ontario's young referees this season through the Provincial Officiating Development Program (P.O.D.). Each region in Ontario nominates approximately two referees to participate. The program usually takes two years to complete so some years regions might not be in a position to nominate any new referees. Other years they may be able to nominate two. The goal of the program is that over two seasons, participants will first earn their 2B/2A level, and then enough 3C evaluations to apply for upgrade.

Referees are generally between the ages of 17 and 30 years old. They have officiated for a minimum of two years, but in many cases it is about four years. They usually enter the program at a 2C level, and have only minimal experience officiating U12PP. The ideal candidate is a newer referee who is eager, regularly makes time to officiate, and has taken the evaluation process seriously to move up to a 2C. The time commitment for P.O.D. makes it quite feasible for fulltime university/college students to participate.

If you are interested in being nominated for P.O.D. you need to contact your Regional Coordinator and express your interest. In the season leading up to being nominated, it is suggested that you have officiated at a few tournaments beyond your home association's, and that you officiate at Regionals.

Every two years, the province of Ontario hosts the Ontario Winter Games (OWGs). Every region selects its best U19AA players to form their own AAA team. Just as the athletes undergo a selection process, so to do the officials. In order to be chosen to officiate at this prestigious event, I was first selected to attend one of three Challenge Cup tournaments that took place during the season. I attended the Challenge Cup in Sudbury. Each Challenge Cup had

4-5 different officials attending. At these events, we were being observed by our supervisors quite closely as it was from these 15 officials that we would eventually be whittled down to the final five.

I was extremely proud to be selected to officiate at the OWG's and even more so when I was selected to referee the gold medal game. It was the culmination of ALOT of hard work and dedication to a sport that I love. To be told for years that I would never ref higher than a 4C ranking and then to be selected to ref the final at OWG's was AMAZING!

The entire process was an interesting and rewarding experience. At most events we attend as officials, we are members of a very large crew (ie. tournaments, regionals, provincials) and are spread out over numerous sheets of ice. It often feels like we never even see some members of the crew!

At this event I was one of five on-ice official's reffing on one amazing ice surface! The players, coaches, fans, and possibly even the rink attendants knew us by name at the end of the event (they even let us sit on the zamboni). It truly was a ringette family, slightly dysfunctional at times, but definitely a family :-)

So you want to be a referee? Prepare for the worst!

The following article was taken from skoda-hockey.com and is a good reflection of what we go through as officials.

There are many unrewarding occupations and being a referee is one of them. To some extent, it is quite a courageous deed to put on that striped shirt. It is as if you have joined forces with the Devil or turned to Evil. Once you decide to become a referee, you must count on everyone hating and cursing you. You might even lose your friends. So, what could possibly make you choose this most unpopular path?

To become the person in the striped shirt is quite easy. But it is usually an involuntary act. It is just about being in the wrong place at the wrong time. "The pupils are playing a friendly game, however, there is no referee. But you play hockey, don't you? So, let's go and referee the game," is often heard at the start of a refereeing career.

You are fifteen or sixteen years old when someone puts a whistle in your hand and you put on the black and white shirt. You start to feel a little bit excited, but nervous as well. You were in the line-up a hundred times, but as a player, not as a referee. You got upset whenever a foul on you remained unpunished or when you had to take an early shower. You really felt like lynching the referee at that moment. And now you are one of them! Should I hold the whistle in the left or the right hand? Should I face the bully or have my back against the boards? Should I blow the whistle for off-side straight away or play an advantage? But this is only a fraction of all the things swirling through your head when you referee a game for the first time. The game is strewn with your errors, but, as it only is a friendly match, everything is fine. You just leave with a small financial reward in your pocket and you tell yourself: "This is a great part-time job!"

Going through purgatory

So, finally, you decide to get a license. It is not difficult to do. Practically, you get it just by taking part in the training. You won't learn a lot, but you learn most of it on the job anyway. Every single game raises your self-confidence. But it won't be painless of course. You will have to go through purgatory where there are no free rides. The most unrewarding games are the ones in the schoolchildren category. It is not the players themselves, but their parents who become the most annoying part of every match. You even wonder how parents can use such dreadful language, not just directed at the referees, but even at their own kids. "How can you play like that?! You should be killing him by the boards" a father is shouting at his son who is doing his best to follow his father's advice. So, during his next time on the ice, he seriously fouls his opponent and goes crying to the changing room. Whose fault is it? Yes, it is referee's fault! "Just you wait until after the game, I'll be waiting for you in front of the stadium!" an infuriated parent threatens the referee.

Some games just don't go your way

But a referee must always refuse to be provoked by the spectators, even when they are right. Some games just don't go your way. A referee is just a person who errs, particularly when it is him- or herself refereeing the game. And it also happens that, at times, a single person must do a job usually done by three or four people together. To be present by the goal, keep an eye on the blue line at the same time, and pray with all your heart that there won't be a breakaway, because you would never make it to the opposite goal in time. In such cases, it is always up to the referee to make that instant decision and all on his or her own, and without hesitating, if possible. How easy, then, is it to referee a match in higher competitions where your colleagues can help you or where there is the technical support.

Study Programme "The referee of team sports"

In Europe, matches are refereed by several thousands of referees. In the Czech Republic alone, there are about 1800 referees registered, according to information from the Czech Ice Hockey Association, of which 20 are women. The minimum age limit for getting a license is 15 years. Anyone, who would like to take the role of a referee really seriously can go for the Bachelor study programme "The referee of team sports", focused on ice hockey. Since 2011, more than 70 applicants for this study programme have been admitted at the Masaryk University in Brno. But, you can become a good referee even without a university education.

A kind word tends to be more effective

If a young referee is skillful he or she can work their way up the ladder and, in time, start to referee ever higher-quality competitions. But, they must start from scratch. They must learn how to read the game and, more importantly, how to communicate with players and trainers, to show them their human side, but be able to earn their respect as well. He or she should be more sensitive with younger players, because a kind word tends to be more effective than the penalty itself. On the other hand, with men, a young referee must adjust the rule and frequently ignore the criticisms of older players, one of whom might even be his father.

Not only by rules, but by intuition

As time goes on, the referees realize that they don't referee only by the rules, but also by their own intuition. It is often the ref keeping a rein on the match. Refereeing is an affair of the heart and one is stricter now and then more benevolent. There is much fondness, apathy and keenness for the game, excitement and adrenaline inside. "What are you looking at?! That was way off-side!" resounds quite often through ice hockey stadiums. And no sooner does the referee make his mistake, than a goal is scored. So now what? The referee at fault just wishes the ice would open up and swallow him, but there is nothing left to do but to act like a man. You either spill the beans and just say that you saw no off-side because you were looking elsewhere or better still say it straight that there was no off-side. Annoying decisions make for even more annoying emotions. But you must be able to snap out of every annoying situation, even though the crowd doesn't agree with your decisions. But, apart from goals, passes, fouls and body-checks, hockey is also about emotions without which, this game just wouldn't be the same.

Waterloo's Chris Faulds Wins Provincial Official of the Year

After years of multi-tasking as an official and a Coach, Chris Faulds made a conscious decision to pursue an officiating career.

Once, content to ref local games at the "B" level and a few "A" games, he soon found himself eager to achieve a higher level of officiating. For Chris, traveling to tournaments and other associations opened up more



opportunities to be seen by multiple evaluators and Referee in Chief's.

As the evaluations came in and his officiating level continued to rise, he set his goal on attending Provincials. He attended his first Provincial in 2011 and has never looked back since. Having achieved his goal of Provincials, it was time to set new sights. His next aspiration would the Ontario Winter Games and the Canadian Ringette Championships. It gives me great pleasure to announce that Chris has now obtained both of these goals, as well. He attended his first CRC's in 2013 in Fredericton, NB followed by Regina, SK in 2014 where he was selected for the U16 semi-final. Last season, Chris was also selected for the OWG's in Bala where he earned the gold medal game.

Congratulations on achieving these milestones. It just goes to prove that if you set your mind on something and work hard, you can succeed.

Ringette Canada Issues Memo on Move it or Lose it Rule

Ringette Canada recently issued a memo to all officials regarding the assessment of penalties due to play along the boards. The memo states the following:

With the implementation of the move it or lose it rule last season, it has been observed that the play along the boards has become more aggressive.

As such, the Ringette Canada Officiating Development Committee would like to emphasize the following for the 2014/2015 season:

A player, <u>with no intention</u> of playing the ring that <u>forces</u> <u>and pins</u> the ring carrier into the boards to cause a stoppage must be penalized for holding.

A player that legally plays the ring, but uses <u>excessive</u> force to pin the ring carrier into the boards must be penalized for boarding.

Random Reminders

- 1. Anyone 18 years of age or older, must have a valid Police Records Check by November 15 of the current playing season
- 2. Registration is due by September 15 or before stepping on the ice.
- 3. Applications for the Outreach or National Scouting Program funding can be found on the ORA website and are due by October 31. Applications are to be sent to the ORA office.
- 4. In order to upgrade, you MUST fill out an on-line "Upgrade Form" and send it to the Evaluations Manager (Pat Turcotte). This applies for all levels. This form is found on the ORA website under the "Officiating Development"
- 5. Be proactive: don't wait until the end of the season to ask for feedback and evaluations.

There has been some confusion on the required stickers and labels on Ringette sticks.

As a reminder:

4.2.b The Ringette stick may be made of wood, plastic, aluminum or any similar material. In the case of composite sticks that employ more than one material in their construction, only shafts and tips that are specifically manufactured for each other may be used.

Labels/stickers applied post-manufacture are not considered a manufacturer's marking and will be considered illegal for play.
